
## Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA) and The Geffen Contemporary at MOCA – Free Admission www.moca.org



## Anecdote to Fact: Telling Your Financial Story without Apology San Gabriel

Arts education organizations responding to Nonprofit Finance Fund's 2014 State of the Sector Survey reported that long-term financial sustainability was their biggest challenge. This session will provide data to support the anecdotal stories that arts leaders share every day—data that can be used in case statements, grant proposals, and more.




